He ended up escaping & drew even closer to God as he prayed & studied in a monastery. He felt called to go back to Ireland where he became the bishop. QUICK GRASP OF CATHOLIC FAITH: CANON LAW

THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST Continued. The Holy Eucharist, unique among the sacraments, exists in three forms of modes: 1). a liturgical celebration, the sacrifice of the Mass. 2). food and drink, Holy Communion, the body and blood of Christ, received under the species of bread and wine. 3). Reserved species, an object of veneration. According to Canon Law, any baptized person who is not prohibited by canon law can and must be admitted to Holy Communion (c.912). This fundamental right to Eucharistic communion is based on a person's ecclesial communion; taking communion demonstrates most vividly one's being in the communion of the church (cc. 205, 213, 843). The PREFACE IS NEXT. The people's dialogue is: "And with your spirit", "We lift them up to the Lord", and "It is right and just". There is a special Preface for each Sunday that is read by the priest throughout the holy year. This is a very ancient part of the Eucharistic prayer, including the first part of the "Holy, Holy, Holy" dates back to the time of Jesus when parts of it were recited every morning in the Synagogue. The prayer is both an invitation to us to enter fully into the prayer and one of communal thanksgiving to God for all that He has done for us. COME AND SEE...

EDUCATIONAL CORNER

FIRST READING: This stark prophecy in the Book of Isaiah is about the coming of Christ; he is the "servant" in the name of the Lord to redeem his people. The Exodus of the Israelites from

Egypt was a touchstone for remembering God's deliverance. Every subsequent request for deliverance and salvation necessarily recalled that pivotal event in the history of Israel. God is telling the people about something "NEW". This new thing indicates the coming of the Holy Spirit, the same Spirit who was active in creation and would provide consolation and hope to the people. (CCC 1334, 1363, 2057, 711)

RESPONSORIAL PSALMS: This psalm is all about a harvest of joy. The final section of the song explains to us the mystery of the great fruitfulness of suffering. What is sown in pain and sorrow is reaped in PEACE AND JOY. As Christ taught in the Parable of the Seed, a thing must die and be buried in order to grow and produce an abundance of fruit. Struggling against hardships and acceptance of suffering eventually rebounds in happiness here on earth and in the next life. (CCC 2097, 2619)

SECOND READING: An old saying "Once you know Jesus, nothing else matters"....Paul is speaking to the Philippians about this situation. No pleasure, gift, talent, or riches can rival the invaluable blessing of possessing Christ. The rewards in this life and in the next make any sacrifice not worth considering. This total gift of self, which is at the heart of Christian discipleship, will always be inspired and accompanied by God's grace. (CCC 133, 426-429, 1006, 1522)

GOSPEL: This is the wonderful story of the Pharisees and scribes who tried to entrap Christ with a question about punishing a woman caught in adultery. If he had supported the stoning, he would have violated the Roman Law that forbade the Jews to exact capital punishment; if he had opposed it, the Pharisees would have said that he disregarded the Law of Moses, which called for such a punishment. Instead, Christ turned the question back to the Pharisees, calling them to truthfulness about their own personal moral behavior. While the sin of adultery is always grave, the infinite mercy of God is sufficient to forgive any sin when there is repentance and purpose of amendment. (CCC 2381, 2400)
